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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The OUTCOME BUDGET-2018-19 of Fisheries and Animal Resources Development (F&ARD) Department envisages physical dimensions against financial budget vis-a-vis actual physical performances in preceding years and targets of physical performance of 2018-19. This has been properly projected and planned for serving as a strategy tool for setting up an effective linkage with allocation and disbursement of public funds, on the basis of measurable performance. It also dwells upon the mandate goals and objectives, the policy framework for the Fisheries and Animal Resources Development Sector as well as the various Policy initiatives and reform measures taken up by the Department. The Outcome Budget-2018-19 of Fisheries and Animal Resources Development (F&ARD) Department is therefore aims at converting the "outlays" into "outcomes" through implementation of planned activities. The document while highlighting the status of ongoing and new schemes implemented through the Department so also reflects the physical and financial targets set for the financial year, 2018-19.

The highlights of the Outcome Budget-2018-19 of F&ARD Department narrates the following chapters-

- **Chapter-I:** Over a brief introductory note on organizational setup with functions alongwith the broad programme/ schemes classification and agencies engaged in their implementation vis-a-vis its objectives, mandate, goals and policy framework of the F&ARD Department.
- **Chapter-II:** Gives the break-up in tabular format(s) / statements(s) the outlays and outcomes in respect of major schemes implemented by the Department, its agencies and PSUs. As the schemes/ Projects of the PSUs are too many and varied and mostly related to their day to day operations only major schemes with substantial estimated/ sanctioned cost of Rs.1.00 Crore and above have been highlighted for 2018-19 under Programme Expenditure and EOM Expenditure.
- **Chapter-III:** Envisages reform measures and major policy initiatives of Fisheries and Animal Resources Development to augment fish, meat, milk & egg production and well being of farmers associated with livestock and fishery activities. This chapter also provides the details of such reform measures and policy initiatives taken by the Department visà-vis their intermediary outputs and final outcomes in areas such as Public Private Partnership (PPP), alternative delivery mechanism social and women empowerment process greater decentralization and transparency during the courses of the year.

- **Chapter-IV:** Reviews the past performances during the year, 2017-18 in terms of target already set.
- **Chapter-V:** Financial Review on the Past Performance during the year 2017-18 covering overall trends in expenditure vis-a-vis budget estimates and revised estimate in the current financial year (Actual of the year preceding the previous year, budget estimate and revised estimates of the previous year, budget estimate of the current financial year).
- **Chapter-VI:** Review of performance of the statutory and autonomous bodies under the administrative control of the Department highlights the outlays provided for the schemes benefiting Women, ST&SC groups alongwith the corresponding physical output.

IMPLEMENTATION, MONITORING & EVALUATION MECHANISM:

Fisheries and Animal Resources alongwith Dairy Development Sectors play an important role in the socio-economic development of the country and in turn in the national economic. These sectors also play a significant role in supplementing family incomes through livelihood opportunities and generating gainful employments in rural sector, particularly among the landless labourers, small and marginal farmers and women, besides providing cheap nutritional food to millions of people. Therefore, the Development of Fisheries and Animal Resources Development by extensive emphasis on methodical and persistent monitoring of fisheries and livestock projects including diary development programmes executed under different schemes. This Department is dedicated to reinforce the initiative of State Government for holistic development of poor fishermen, livestock farmers and diary farmers which represent around 70% of Odisha population.

The Department is under the overall charge of Dr. Shashi Bhusan Behera, Hon'ble Minister of Agriculture & Farmers Empowerment, Fisheries & Animal Resources Development, P.E. The administrative head of the Department is the Commissioner-cum-Secretary, F&ARD, who is assisted by one Additional Secretary, four Joint Secretaries and one Financial Adviser-cum-Additional Secretary in discharging the responsibilities assigned to this Department. Two Directors are also there as the key monitoring authorities under the Department vested with the powers of Controlling Authority viz.; the **"Directorate of Fisheries" and "Directorate of Animal Husbandry & Veterinary Services".** The Director of Ports & IWT is the implementing and monitoring agency for the engineering works of Fishing Harbours and Fish Landing Centres under this Department. He is assisted by one Executive Engineer, Fishery Engineering Division and other Assistant Engineers and Junior Engineers of the Fishery Engineering Division at different levels. The Organization Chart of the Department is explained in detail in the Chapter-I. Conventional monitoring mechanism such as field visits, review meetings periodic reports and returns are in place for monitoring and evaluating different projects. Department has also evolved a comprehensive multi-level and multitool structure of monitoring and evaluation for the implementation of its programmes to ensure achievement of the objectives of the schemes and programmes as per the public mandate. Periodical Zonal review, District level meetings, Directorate level evaluations along with Secretary level reviews has strengthened the evaluation mechanism. Regular monitoring of expenditure and periodical review of utilization of budgetary allocations etc. have added value to the Department service in pursuance of the public mandate.

Thus, the Department has an elaborate and separate field network for both the Fisheries Sector & Animal Resources Development Sector. The District Fishery Officer heads at respective Districts to ensure implementation of programmes with the assistance of Addl. Fisheries Officers and different field functionaries like Asst. Fisheries Officer, SFTA and JFTA at Block level. At the level of Block and District, the Officers as above visit regularly to the field and ensure that the programmes are being implemented satisfactorily.

Under the Fisheries Sector one Public Sector Undertaking (PSU) named "Odisha pisciculture Development Corporation Ltd" (OPDC) is functioning for providing adequate quality fish seed to fish farmers of the state. The PSU has 5 fish seed hatcheries and many fish seed rearing tanks through the state to meet the demand of the fish farmers/ entrepreneurs of the state. Aiming at providing fishing nets to the marine as well as inland fishers of the state at a cheaper rate and desired quality, a fish net manufacturing unit is functioning under the OPDC Ltd at Bhubaneswar. It also operates eight diesel outlets in the vicinity of major fish landing centres to cater the needs of local fishers.

Apart from the PSU, one Apex fisheries Co-operative Federation named 'Odisha State Fishermen's Co-operative Federation ltd.(FISHFED) is operating in the state to fore the wellbeing of primary Fishermen Co-operatives (PFCSs) functioning in the Chilika lake and other areas. This federation is also providing fish marketing facilities through its outlet named 'Chilika Fresh" and mobile fish outlets i.e. Fish on Wheel" under PPP mode at Bhubaneswar.

ESTABLISHMENT OF CHILIKA FRESH KIOSKS

The Chilika Fresh Kiosks are the modern hygienic prefabricated fish selling retail Outlets to sell fish and fisheries products to urban consumers & to make available of varieties of Fresh Water, Brackish Water, Marine Fish & Shrimp in Fresh and hygienic condition to the fish loving people. The objective is to market the catch of Fishermen/PFCS directly to consumer omitting the involvement of middleman and generation of employment.

FISHFED has established its own 03 nos. of Chilika Fresh Retail Outlets at Siripur Square, CRP Square and Sahid Nagar. In addition to these, an initiative has been taken to set up 26 nos. of more "Chilika Fresh" in BMC area through PPP mode. Out of proposed 26 nos. of Kiosks, 12 nos. of such outlets have been established by M/S FALCON MARINE EXPORTS (P) LTD through FISHFED at Keshari Talkies, Rasulgarh, VSS Nagar, Jharpada, K9 Kalinga Nagar, Naka Gate, Gandamunda, Dumuduma, SUM Hospital Shyampur, Sailashree Vihar, Patia Raghunathpur and Mancheswar Industrial Area. The balance 14 nos. outlets will be established very soon. Another Kiosk namely "Hirakud Fresh" has already been constructed in Sambalpur Town with the financial support from Western Odisha Development Council (WODC) and it is ready for inauguration. Further EOI for 4 nos Kiosks through PPP mode in Nayagarh, Puri, Bhadrak and Subarnapur has been finalised.

Similarly, Directorate of Animal Husbandry and Veterinary Services has Chief District Veterinary Officer (CDVO), who heads the District for planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of various Schemes at their respective Districts. Recently, the Department has been restructured, where one Sub- Divisional Veterinary Officer (SDVO) for each sub- divisional will look after monitoring of various schemes. The Block Veterinary Officer (BVO), Veterinary Assistant Surgeon (VAS), Additional Veterinary Assistant Surgeons monitor the activities at their jurisdiction. The Livestock Inspectors are the field functionaries working at the cutting edge of community at Gram Panchyat level .For effective implementation monitoring and evaluation; Department Monitoring Units have been formed at suitable level for regular monitoring and concurrent evaluation.

The Odisha State Cooperative Milk Producers' Federation Ltd. (OMFED) lays considerable emphasis on systematic and sustained monitoring of Dairy project executed under different schemes. One Monitoring units is functioning in OMFED and headed by an OSD (MIS, OMS& CSS) and is assisted by one Junior Manager (Finance), one Desk Officer, two Junior Assistants & one Peon.

At the project level, the monitoring works are being looked after by General Manager of respective District Cooperative Mil Producers Union Ltd. implementing the Diary Development activities is assisted by other sub-ordinate staff. Conventional monitoring mechanism such as field visits, review meetings and periodic report and returns are in place for monitoring of projects.

Overall, Chairman-cum- Managing Director, OMFED monitors all the Project activities implemented by OMFED and through its affiliated District Milk Unions.

The following supervision & monitoring mechanism is in practice for smooth execution of Departmental activities.

1. Date Compilation & Transmission: The data/ information from field level are being sent to the Directorate on monthly/half-yearly & annual basis.

2. **Review Meetings**: The Zonal Review Meeting are being held regularly. Various critical issues/ problems/ bottlenecks of the projects are discussed and important decisions are taken in the Plan Review meeting taken up monthly by the Commissioner-cum-secretary.

3. **Field Visits**: Supervising Officers of both the Directorate makes field visit to monitor various Schemes. Senior Officers from OMFED including the Chairmancum- Managing Director make field visits to monitor the progress of the work. They discuss problems with field functionaries and issue necessary instructions for smooth implementation of projects. Besides, officials from the Funding Agencies viz, Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and ARD Department, Rastriya Krishi Vikas Yojana (RKVY) Monitoring Cell, Planning and Coordination Department, Consultants of different projects /Out of State Milk Federation/ out of State District Milk Unions / NABARD / World Bank also regularly visit to the projects to assess the progress of the work.

4. **Nomination of Nodal Officer for Different Districts**: Senior Officers from Directorate of AH & VS, Animal Disease Research Institute, Frozen Semen Bank, Odisha Livestock Resources Development Society, Veterinary Officers Training Institute, Odisha Biological Product Institute are nominated as Nodal Officer for a District to guide and monitor the planned programmes.

5. **Monitoring of Livestock Sector Growth by SLRDC**: State Level Apex Body "State Livestock Resources Development Committee" under the Chairmanship of Development Commissioner, Government of Odisha has been constituted . The Apex Committee for poultry Development has been constituted under the Chairmanship of Agriculture production Commissioner- cum- Additional Chief Secretary, Government of Odisha. These Committees monitor the livestock sector growth.

6. **Inbuilt Monitoring Mechanism**: As per the activity schedule of each scheme target is communicated to field functionaries so as to achieve the intended objective in time. The Branch Officers at both the Directorate monitor the schemes pertaining to their branch.

7. **Odisha State Cooperative Milk producers Federation Ltd**: The Federation is going to implement ERP in Federation, Milk Union and Society Level in order to cater the information from Dairy level.

Local Area Network (LAN) has been established for data transfer between different sections working.

The Department has developed it's website (www.omfed.com) for dissemination of various information which is useful for the Department officials and the public.

8. **Evaluation**: The Department hired the services of NABARD Consultancy Services, Odisha University of Agriculture and Technology, IBS Management

School, Bhubaneswar and Department of MBA (Agriculture) Utkal University, Vanivihar, Bhubaneswar for concurrent Evaluation studies in Animal Resources Development Sector.

Thus the monitoring and evaluation mechanism for the purpose of implementation of different programmes and schemes under this Department extends from top to bottom.

Public Information system:

Information, Education and Communication (IEC) plays a vital role in creating awareness, mobilizing people and making the development participatory through advocacy and by transfer ring knowledge, skills and techniques to the people. Moreover, IEC plays two most important roles informative and as such is crucial for bringing about requisite social mobilization and facilitating participatory development.

The following four pronged strategy that has been adopted by the Department would be continued to ensure maximum benefits out of the programmes of the Department.

1. Creating Awareness about the programmes for the public :

Publication of different printed materials like compendium of Guidelines, Manuals Booklets, pamphlets, Brochures are regularly made. These are brought out in Odia, English and other regional languages for distribution up to the field level, publicity and promotion materials also printed in vernacular languages.

Annual Report and Annual Activity report containing physical and financial Achievements of schemes are being published each year for wide circulation for information of the public and peoples representatives. A part from this "Matsya Darpan" a bimonthly report on fisheries Activities is published by the Department.

OMFED Samachar is being published monthly basis for wide publicity of the concept of participatory Dairy Development by organizing Dairy Cooperative Societies by the farmers. For better involvement Dairy Cooperative Week is being observed throughout the State every year during the period 7th April to 14th April every year.

The farmers of OMFED are being awarded every year from Hon'ble Chief Minister of Odisha in the State Level Agriculture Fair "Krishi Mahostav".

2. Ensuring Transparency in the Implementation of the Programmes at the Field Level:

For publication of major schemes the Department has undertaken publicity campaigns by Organizing Mela, Trade Fares, Seminars/ Workshops, Buyer-Seller Meets to create awareness amongst fishermen, including those under Animal Husbandry and Dairy Sector.

3. Encouraging Participation of the People in the Development Process:

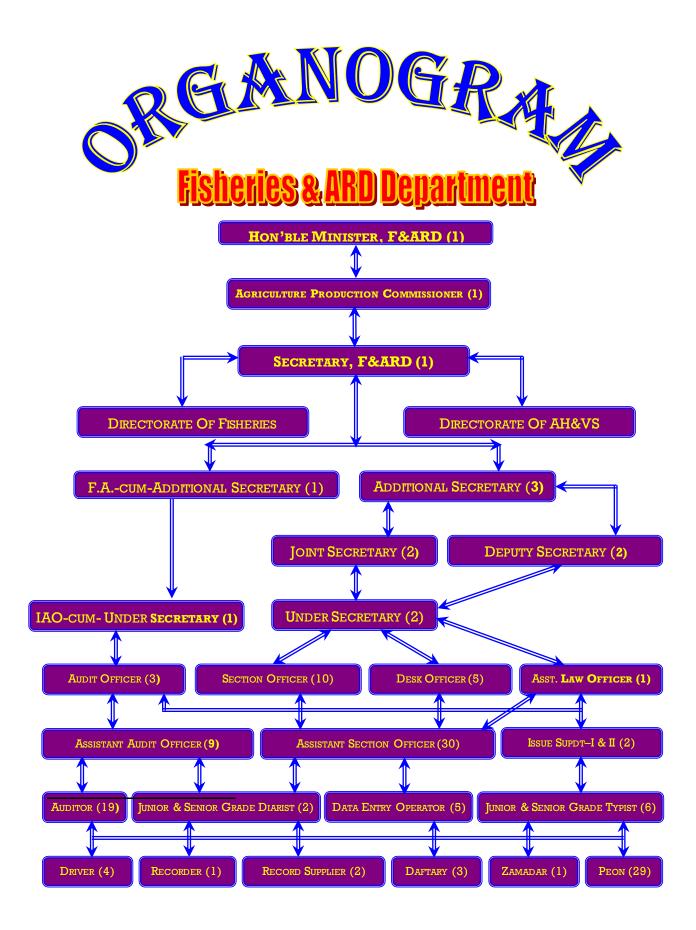
For the purpose, Fisheries Co-operative Societies are being encouraged in large scale with a view to bring information relating to implementation of various schemes in public domain, scheme details and also the progress of implementation are hosted in the Department's Website which is updated regularly. It basically provides information on Schemes & Programmes, Acts & Rules, Reports, Publication, Documents, Conferences, Seminars, Office Circulars/Notices, Fishermen related news etc. Dairy Cooperative Societies are organized to empower the dairy farmers and to dispose their surplus milk at a remunerative price.

4. Promoting the Concept of Social Audit & Accountability:

For the first time, healthcare facilities at doorstep of the farmers and others for small and big animals has been started in every Block as per fixed route chart in the name of " Mobile Health Camps", where veterinary services such as preventive, curative, breeding and advisory services are rendered. The various stake holders like livestock owners, Panchayat Raj Institution (PRI) representatives & progressive farmers participate in the programme at community level.

Under National Mission for Protein Supplement (NMPS), the beneficiaries are selected through a transparent process by involving PRI members.

In some schemes guidelines, internal audit is mandatory. Steps are being taken to promote internal audit for ongoing schemes in phased manner. Apart from that, all the project activities are being also audited by CAG Audit.



<u>CHAPTER – I</u>

INTRODUCTION:

The Department of Fisheries & Animal Resources Development came into being in the year 1991 after being bifurcated from the erstwhile Forest, Fisheries & Animal Husbandry Department; vide General Administration Department Resolution No.28038/Gen., Dt.10.10.1990.

The Department aims at promoting fishery potential of the State and to step up export as well as increase milk, egg and meat production through various means in addition to providing Veterinary Services to a large number of livestock populations.

The Department aims to achieve its objective through the following measures:-

- 1. Enlarging Fresh Water Resources for Pisciculture.
- 2. Maximizing utilisation of Brackish Water Resources in an eco-friendly manner.
- 3. Harnessing Marine Resources in greater proportion to reach MSY (Maximum Sustainable Yield).
- 4. Adopting modern technology for Pisciculture.
- 5. Improving professionalism through exposure visit/ training/ counselling.
- 6. Forming Cooperatives for community participation and expanding market potential.
- 7. Encouraging private sector to take up Scientific Farming adopting latest technology.
- 8. Encouraging creation/ development of infrastructure through PPP mode.

The Fisheries & ARD Department is basically a service sector and extension oriented technical Department. It consists of two sectors namely Fisheries Sector & Animal Resources Development Sector. The sector-wise information is as follows:

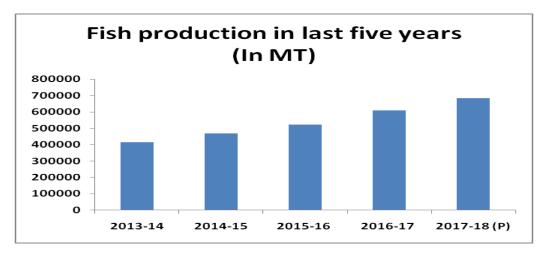
FISHERIES SECTOR

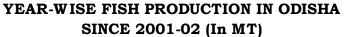
Odisha, being a maritime State, offers tremendous opportunities for development of Fresh Water, Brackish Water and Marine Fisheries with ample scope of fish production together with employment and income generation for overall socio-economic prosperity. Fresh Water resources of the State include 1.33 lakh ha. of Ponds / Tanks, 2.00 lakhs ha of Reservoirs, 1.80 lakhs ha. of Lakes, Swamps and Jheels and 1.71 Lakhs ha. of Rivers and Canals. The Brackish Water resources include 2.98 lakhs ha. of Estuaries, 32,587 ha. of Brackish Water land suitable for Shrimp Culture Programme out of which 20270 ha. have already been developed. The largest Indian brackish water lagoon Chilika Lake measuring 79000 ha is a capture source being operated through co-operatives. The marine sector is extended over a 480 km of coast line in the six coastal districts. The area under continental shelf is 24000 square kilometers. The inland and brackish water sector is culture fisheries based and the marine and reservoir sector of the inland area is capture fisheries based.

Fish is a popular food item in Odisha per capita consumption of fish per annum in the State is 13.49 kg. by end of 2016-17. The fish production in Freshwater, Brackish water and Marine sector is 3,93,730 MT, 61,268 MT and 1,53,102 MT respectively totalling to 6,08,100 MT during the year 2016-17. During the year 2017-18, 4,54,189 MT (P) in freshwater sector, 79,936 MT (P) in brackish water sector and 1,50,839 M.T (P) in marine sector totalling to 6,84,963 MT (P) has been produced against the target of 4,65,970 MT in freshwater, 87,450 MT in brackishwater and 1,45,000 MT in Marine sector totalling to 6,98,420 M.T. 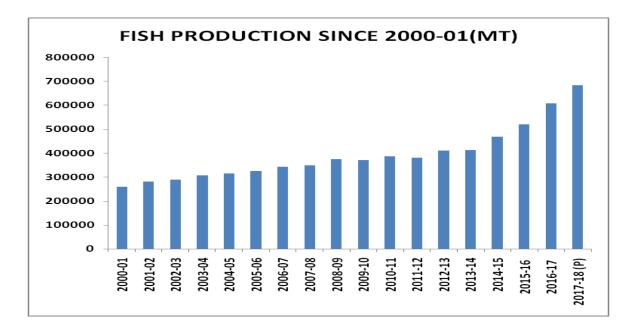

The State has collected user charges from farmers and entrepreneurs through FFDAs to the tune of 66.38 lakhs during 2017-18. Fresh Water Prawn Culture, Ornamental Fish Culture, Magur culture and medium carp culture are being taken up in the State for entrepreneurs and the unemployed youth under crop diversification programme. Efforts have been made to increase inland fish production through other line Departments under schemes like RKVY & MGNREGS & through Central Sector Scheme. The State has produced 382.27 crores and 80.76 crores Spawn & Fry respectively during 2017-18. The emphasis has been given to create more hatcheries, nurseries and rearing spaces in Private Sector. Efforts are being taken, for production and supply of fingerlings/ yearlings for enhancement of fish production and also the steps are being taken to meet the missing links of the infrastructural gaps under different ongoing schemes of the state as well as Government of India like BR & RKVY etc. Additional water areas, to the extent of 791.13 Ha. under Matsva Pokhari Yajana and 56.00 Ha under MGNREGS Schemes totalling to 847.13 ha, has been developed during 2017-18.

The State's long coastline, measuring 480 km. provides ample scope for marine export and livelihood support to about 3.5 lakhs fishermen. The marine fishermen subsist on marine resources by using 4 fishing Harbours and 69 Jetties and Fish Landing Centres. 1,53,402 M.T. Marine Fish has been produced against the target of 1,45,000 M.T. during 2016-17 and 1,50,839 M.T Marine Fish has been produced during the year 2017-18.

Brackishwater areas of 774.00 ha have been developed during 2017-18, against target of 800 ha with a Shrimp production target of 56000.00 MT. The production achieved was 58,110.00 MT. During the current year the L.vannamei culture will be taken-up and the shrimp production per unit area will go up which will increase the total shrimp production of the State. Around 14,000 ha of area will be under vannamei culture.

Department has introduced a scheme namely Organisation of Skill up gradation Training and Awareness Meet (State plan) to enhance the skills, technological knowledge and managerial efficiencies of fish farmers covered under FFDA, Blue Revolution and RKVY programme as well as educated youth associated or identified in various fisheries programme. The training is imparted in both Fresh water and Brackish water sector to acquaint the fish farmers in activities like fish farming, seed rearing, diversification of species, reservoir stocking, integrated farming for enhancing productivity. The duration of training is 15 days and out of which 12 days theory class and 3 days field visit. Total nos. of trainees is 770(600 nos. from Fresh water and 170 nos. from Brackish Water). Similarly the aim of awareness meet is for wide publicity about the implementation of different schemes among the stake holders. During the year of 2017-18, 935 nos. of Fish Farmers have been imparted skill upgradation training .It has been planned to train 1035 nos. fish farmers during 2018-19. Poverty alleviation of the fishermen is crucial for augmenting of fish production. The State has taken strategy to setup organization of the farmers, for technological up-gradation, supply of inputs, establishment of marketing linkage, training of fishermen and above all infrastructure development which aims to increase earnings of fishermen to remove their poverty along with doubling of fish production.

The rationale underlying fisheries management, exploitation and development is beginning to change. Where, once the focus was primarily on producing greater quantities of fish, the emphasis is now gradually moving, through concepts such as responsible fishing and sustainable management, towards wealth and revenue generation and their appropriate distribution. This change in focus presents new challenges to fisheries administration.

As our development challenges have evolved, and our understanding of the concerns in sustainable development has sharpened, there is a need to review the earlier objectives, policy instruments, and strategies for fisheries management and development in Odisha State. This dynamic change requires evolving a flexible policy framework with a built-in long-term strategic action plan. Different plan and program is being taken up in line with Odisha Fishery Policy for holistic development of Fisheries Sector of the State.

MANDATE

- Quantitative and qualitative appraisal of the fishery resources and their potential in the State of Odisha,
- Enhancing the productivity and production of fish from the Inland, Brackish and Marine Water Resources,
- Tapping the untapped potential of aquaculture to contribute to food and nutritional security,
- Bridging the gap between the demand and supply of fish for domestic consumption,
- Harnessing the opportunity of expanding export markets for high-value products to increase investment in aquaculture production & processing,
- Capacity building, technological intervention, Human Resource Development, Research & Development, Awareness Building and Education of fisher folk and other stakeholders,
- Upgradation of infrastructure facilities in the Fishery Sector like FHs / FLCs, cold chain, road connectivity, etc.,
- Upgradation of the overall quality of fish with emphasis on hygienic postharvest handling,
- > Encouraging private sector investment across the sector,
- Generating additional employment opportunities in the rural sector for the fishers, educated unemployed youth and others,

- > To alleviate the incidence of poverty of traditional fishermen by offering them alternative employment opportunities,
- > To develop Chilika fishery as a fully managed, sustainable fishery with stakeholder participation,
- Fisheries resource conservation, management and development through enforcement of relevant Acts, Rules and Regulations,
- Improving fisheries governance and defining resource access, in particular for the poorer sections of the society,
- Health care to the fishermen implementation of the welfare schemes of Government of India and the State.

The following activities and programmes are proposed to be given priority in the Annual Plan – 2018-19.

- 1. To promote sustainable development in Inland Sector for doubling fish production.
- 2. To stock Fingerlings/ Yearlings for enhancement of fish production and productivity.
- 3. To enhance contribution of Fishery Sector to Food and Livelihood security of the people engaged in fisheries.
- 4. To promote Public Private Partnership in developing, managing, conserving and sharing the Fishery resources for the benefit of the State.
- 5. To create unlighted human resources by capacity building, through Training & Awareness Programme.

4. Machha Chasa Pain Nua Pokhari Khola Yojana-2017-18 & 2018-19:

Government of Odisha implemented a new State Plan Scheme "Machha Chasa Pain Nua Pokhari Khola Yojana" renamed as "Matsyapokhari Yojana" during the year 2017-18 with budget provision of Rs.4799.96 lakh for excavation of new ponds of 1059.00 Ha and 200 Ha of advanced fingerling production .During the year 2018-19,it has been targeted for development of 1070.58 ha in freshwater within Budget Provision Rs.4599.94lakh in order to provide supports to fish farmers for horizontal expansion towards vertical rise in Fish production, exports & livelihood supports under Inland Sector. During 2017-18,new pond of 643.35 Ha has been developed by 931 nos of beneficiaries and 364.90 ha water areas have created during 2018—19 till date by 491 nos of beneficiaries. The district wise target and achievement, funds allotted and beneficiaries benefitted for the year 2017-18 & 2018-19 are given in the Annexure.

5. Development of Fisheries in collaboration with International Institution:-

The expenditure of Rs. 3.39 Crore (USD.521600) shall be incurred as per the approved action plan. As per MoA signed between Govt. of Odisha & WorldFish Malaysia on 28.06.2016, the amount shall be provided to WorldFish towards consultancy support. The planned activities are :-

With the consultancy support of Worldfish during 2017-18, total of 301.5 acres of backyards ponds & GP tanks and MIPs belonging to 1992 beneficiaries has been taken under the promotional strategies for Carp-Mola Production in ponds, tanks, reservoirs & floodplains. Under the state plan scheme "Development of Inland Fisheries Policy-2015" Carp intensification was carried out in 288 Acres of community ponds benefitting 842 households. Under RKVY scheme of "promotion of Carp Advanced Fingerlings and BMPs" 95 acre area was covered benefitting 95 farmers. Under the state plan scheme "Reservoir Fisheries Development under Odisha Fisheries Policy-2012" total of 13 reservoirs were stocked with seeds covering 900 beneficiaries. GIFT tilapia promotion was carried out in 36 ponds covering 33.3 acres of area. To uplift the socio-economic status of small and marginal farmers, several orientations, awareness & training programmes were held.

6. Matsya Sampad Vikas Utsav:-

The scheme aims at providing ample support to fishermen cooperatives Self Help Groups for ranching of fish seed in Dead Rivers, to increase fish population. The freshwater water bodies of the state will be stocked with advanced fingerlings for replenishment and conservation of fish genetic resources. During the year 2018-19 advance IMC fingerlings of 81-100 mm size will be stocked. Rs 96.00 lakhs will be utilized towards stocking of advanced size IMC fingerlings & generation of awareness amongst stake holders, organize meetings in state level, District level & Block level along with mobility expenses.

Reservoir Fisheries Development

- **7. Promotion of Reservoir Fishery Production**: The scheme envisages for Reservoir development programme like fingerling stocking, pen culture and allied activities shall be taken up in selected reservoirs.
- **8.** Infrastructure for Cage Culture: The scheme envisages for installation of 2 batteries of cages in reservoirs with State Plan assistance of Rs.50.00 lakhs and taking up fish production in cages through PPP mode.

Implementation of Fisheries Policy

- **9. Development of Marine Fisheries:** The scheme envisages for development of Marine Fisheries as per Odisha Fisheries Policy, 2015 under Marine sector.
- **10. Development of Brackishwater Fisheries:** The new scheme envisages for development of Brackishwater Fisheries as per Fisheries Policy.
- **11. Welfare of Fishermen:** The scheme envisages for Welfare of Fishermen as per Fisheries Policy.
- 12. Development of Inland Fisheries: The new Scheme advocates at Resource mapping, Development of waterlogged areas/ Dead Rivers/ Tampras, Development of Rivers/ open water bodies, Development of Swamps & Low lying Areas, Collaboration with other Organizations for fisheries development, Establishment of Captive Nurseries/ Cage/ Pen/ Fingerling stocking in Reservoirs, Demonstration of intensive aquaculture, Augmentation of small & indigenous fish production, Setting up of Diagnostic Laboratories, Establishment of Fish & Prawn Hatcheries, Promotion of Deep Sea Fishing, Development of Shore base facilities/ FH & FLCs, Post harvest Management & value addition along with ranching of fish seeds.
- **13. Fisheries Development:** The new scheme aims at promoting carp intensification, advance fingerling production, Establishment of GIFT Tilapia Hatchery & Multiplication Centre and Brood stock Development in Govt/ Govt owned farms & Hatcheries.

ANIMAL RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT (ARD) SECTOR

Structure & Function

Livestock have been an integral component of India's agricultural and rural economy since time immemorial. Livestock sector in Odisha is highly livelihood intensive and over 80 per cent of its rural households own livestock of one species or the other and earn supplementary incomes from them. Livestock holding is less iniquitous than land holding and income from livestock is more equitably distributed. The contribution of this sector is significant to the State's net domestic product and therefore, development of the livestock sector is the critical pathway to rural prosperity.

The Animal husbandry sector is harbouring a very good number of livestock wealth providing subsidiary income to the farming community of the State. In Odisha according to the Livestock Census - 2012 the total cattle and buffalo population is 123.47 lakh, small ruminants 80.94 lakh, pig 2.80 lakh & poultry birds 198.14 lakhs. There is an increase in cross bred population. The milk production is steadily rising mainly due to increase in per animal production.

As regard the service delivery is concerned various veterinary institutions as well as mobile veterinary service units spread over the State to provide veterinary health services and play a major role in increasing the production potentialities of the livestock and poultry.

As per Basic Animal Husbandry Statistics, 2017, it ranks 11th among Indian States in egg production, 13th in meat production and 16th in terms of milk production (2016-17). Next to Agriculture, Animal Husbandry has the most important economic activity in the rural areas. Development of Livestock Sector therefore, is critical to rural prosperity. The sector is providing subsidiary to major sources of income to the large numbers of cultivators, small farmers, marginal farmers, BPL families and agricultural labourers.

Keeping in view the objective of turning the State Animal Husbandry & Livestock Production activities to reach the targeted goal of higher per capita availability in terms of milk, meat & egg, Plan has been formulated. The Vision, Mission & Goal set for the Livestock Sector are as follows:

Vision:

To excel as a holistic support system by providing, securing and facilitating effective and efficient services to become self sufficient/ surplus in milk, egg and meat by enhancing Livestock productivity along with helping the poor to secure sustainable livelihood through livestock development and management while working in close coordination and partnership with allied institutions.

Mission:

- To make Animal Resources Development an engine of growth of the rural economy of Odisha, providing income and livelihood opportunities to the people.
- > To make dairying a viable livelihood option for small, marginal farmers and landless persons by strengthening all forward and backward linkages.
- To enable poor farmers to improve the productivity of animals like sheep, goat and pig.
- > To make backyard poultry a popular and viable subsidiary farming activity in rural area
- > Achieve self sufficiency/ surplus in milk, meat and egg production
- Enhance per capita availability of milk, eggs, and meat including poultry meat.
- > Enhance availability of feed and fodder for economic dairy farming.

> Provide efficient veterinary services at the door step of the farmers.

Goals:

- > Increase milk production to 4.8 million MT per annum by 2020.
- > Increase Meat production to 110 TMT per annum by 2020.
- > Increase egg production to 100 lakhs eggs per day by 2020.
- > Increase poultry meat production to 100 TMT per annum by 2020.

The activities of the Animal Husbandry Sector have been oriented towards health of livestock and increased production of milk, meat and eggs and to provide adequate draft power for agricultural operations. The schemes of the Animal Husbandry Sector have been formulated in pursuance to the well-laid National policies to improve the Livestock production, to fight protein hunger and to improve nutritional standards of human population and also provide technical support for the maintenance of livestock and improvement of livestock breeds.

The performance of the Livestock Sector during last year and projection for the current year is given below.

Institutional Mechanism

The Directorate of Animal Husbandry & Veterinary Services is functioning as the Heads of the Department at Cuttack. There are 30 Chief District Veterinary Officers in each Revenue Districts and 58 Sub–Divisional Veterinary Officers (SDVO) are functioning in 58 revenue Sub–Divisions. The Chief District Veterinary Officer is the Controlling Authority for all the Departmental activities implemented in the respective district.

There are 541 Veterinary Hospitals / Dispensaries, 3239 Livestock Aid Centres in the State to provide veterinary services. These institutions provide outdoor treatment and doorstep health and artificial insemination services. Besides this there are 314 Mobile Veterinary Units in each block of the State and one Veterinary Ambulance at Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation Area are providing doorstep health care services at present.

The State has three Clinical Investigation Laboratories, one State Veterinary Laboratory, one Animal Disease Research Institute, one Frozen Semen Bank and two Biological Product Institute. One Veterinary Officer's Training Institute, three Livestock Inspector Training Centres, one Frozen Semen Artificial Insemination Training Centre, one Animal Disease Training Centre, one Fodder Training Centre are catering to the capacity building needs of the Veterinary Department field staff.

Important Schemes

The Annual Programme Expenditure Outlay for 2018-19 under ARD Sector has been estimated for **Rs.306.23 Crores.** There is an increase of **20.29** % during 2018-19 in compares to 2017-18. The Annual Plan covers schemes for dairy development, poultry development, small animal development and fodder development in States own State Plan schemes with an outlay of Rs. **157.38 Crores.** Similarly, an outlay of, **Rs. 91.33 Crores** has been proposed under Central Sector Schemes "White Revolution – Rashstriya Pasudhan Vikas Yojana" which includes Livestock Health and Disease Control Programme, National Livestock Mission, National Mission for Bovine Productivity. Under RIDF an amount of **Rs.57.52 Crores** has been proposed.

Similarly, under Administrative expenditure **Rs 348.72 Crores** has been proposed. The outlay has increased by Rs 26.25 Crores in compares to last year, which is increased by 8.14 %. The administrative expenditure relates to establishment & operational cost of the administrative and field level organizations of ARD sector.

It is also proposed to ear mark at least 30% of total beneficiaries for women farmers under different livelihood programmes. The brief description of activities proposed to take up during 2018-19 in ARD Sector is as follows. The brief description of activities proposed to take up during 2018-19 in ARD Sector has been detailed below.

NEW SCHEMES PROPOSED

A. POULTRY DEVELOPMENT

1. Promotion of Backyard Poultry Rearing

Each farmer will be provided with 50 nos. of 4 wks old Low Input Technology chicks (Vanaraja, Chhabro, Kuroiler & Rainbow Rooster etc.) for scaling up of backyard poultry production. This will enhance the income of farmers in rural area and also provide nutritional security at household level. 29,000 Farmers will be supported for rearing 50 poultry birds worth Rs. 2500/per beneficiary under scavenging system and another Rs 500 for night shelter. An amount of Rs **878.11** lakh has been proposed in the BE for the year 2018-19 under the scheme including administrative & monitoring expenses.

2. Support to farmers for Layer Farming in deep litter system

During 2018-19, it has been planned to support 360 nos of farmers for setting up of 200 bird capacity (Kalinga Brown) layer farm in deep litter system with 50% capital subsidy of unit cost of Rs. 1.40 lakh. Each farmer will be assisted with Rs 70,000/- under the scheme. An amount of **Rs. 254.00** lakh has been provisioned for the Year 2018-19 under the scheme including administrative & monitoring expenses.

B. DAIRY DEVELOPMENT

3. Incentive to Dairy Farmers

To eliminate the de-motivation among rural dairy farmers tempted to withdraw from dairy activity and to maintain the pace of growth in milk production, it has been proposed to provide incentive for supporting the dairy farmers through OMFED. Incentive of Rs. 1.00/Kg. of milk (for 1208.29 lakh kg of milk) will be provided. An amount of **Rs 1208.29** lakh has been proposed in the BE for the year 2018-19.

4. Integrated Livestock Development Programme for 285 Cattle Development Centers in Western & Coastal Districts of the State through BAIF

Cattle breeding program will be implemented through a network of Cattle Development Centres. 170 CDC will be established in Angul, Balangir, Bargarh, Boudh,Kalahandi, Koraput, Nabrangpur, Nuapada, Sambalpur and Sonepur & 115 CDC will be established in 6 districts of Coastal areas i.e Ganjam, Puri, Cuttack, Kendrapara, Jagatsinghpur & Jajpur. Project period is 3 years. Each CDC will cover at least 1200 to 1500 breedable cattle population for genetic improvement of Cattle through Artificial Insemination. It is targeted to achieve 113239 female progenies to be borne under this project. An amount of **Rs 994.66** lakh has been proposed in the BE for the year 2018-19.

5. Short Term Credit Support to Livestock Farmers

Farmers pursuing dairy/ goat/ sheep/ poultry/ duck/ pig farming as an income generating activity and availing short term loan, would get interest subvention of 3% from this scheme to those farmers who will make timely repayment. An amount of **Rs 400.00** lakh has been proposed in the BE for the year 2018-19. Approximately 16720 farmers will get benefit during 2018-19.

6. Long Term Credit Support to Livestock Farmers

3% Interest Subvention will be given to those beneficiaries who will avail finance for livestock farming (Dairy, Small Animals & Poultry Enterprise) under interest subvention on long Term Credit support. Additional 2% interest subvention will also be given to the beneficiaries who will make timely payment. The maximum limit of loan to be availed by the beneficiaries is Rs. 10.00 Lakhs. The maximum period for repayment of loan under the scheme is one year. An amount of **Rs 45.00 lakh** has been proposed in the BE for the year 2018-19. About 300 farmers will be benefitted.

7. Promotion of Dairy Entrepreneurship

The scheme is proposed to promote setting up small dairy units for production of clean milk and to generate self-employment. Support will be provided for establishment of 2 cow units. The capital subsidy will be back ended. 25% subsidy for General category and 33.33% subsidy for SC/ST category will be provided. Subsidy will be released through Commercial / Cooperative Banks involving SLBC. About 570 nos. of beneficiaries will be benefited during the financial year 2018-19. During the financial year **Rs. 200.00** lakh has been provisioned towards subsidy.

C. SMALL ANIMAL DEVELOPMENT

8. Integrated Livestock Development Programme for 25 Goat Development Centers in Western & Northern Districts of the State through BAIF

Twenty Five Goat development centers were established in five districts namely Sundargarh, Deogarh, Keonjhor, Mayurbhanj and Balangir since 2010. The existing project will close on 31st March 2018. It is proposed to continue this program for another two years. 3400 breeding bucks will be supplied for genetic improvement of local goats. 750 Field Guides will be trained and awareness of farmers will be done. Regular vaccination, deworming of goats will be taken up in the project area. An amount of **Rs 179.00** lakh has been proposed in the BE for the year 2018-19.

D. DISEASE CONTROL PROGRAMME

9. Establishment of GMP Compatible Vaccine Production Unit for Anthrax & ETV

Establishment of GMP compatible Vaccine Production Unit at Berhampur for production of Anthrax & Enterotoxaemia vaccine has been proposed. An initial provision of an amount of **Rs 100.00** lakh has been proposed in the BE for the year 2018-19 under RIDF. This will help to control and contain Anthrax in animals in the State.

Highlights of Other Major Ongoing Schemes

A. POULTRY DEVELOPMENT:

- 1. Encouragement of Commercial Poultry Entrepreneur and Promotion of Backyard Poultry Production: To boost back yard poultry production 48 nos. of hatcheries are made operational. These hatcheries will be provided with recurring expenses along with the 8 poultry & 2 duck breeding farms. It is proposed to establish 50 nos. of brooding units adjacent to hatcheries in order to ensure availability of one month old chicks for better survivability at farmers' level. An amount of **Rs 200.40** lakh has been proposed.
- 2. Under National Livestock Mission: During 2018-19, 480 farmers will be covered under Innovative Poultry Productivity Project broiler farming. Each farmer will be given assistance of Rs. 1.125 lakh (Capital Cost Rs. 31,500, Recurring Cost 81,000/-). Budgetary Provision of Rs 540.00 lakh has been proposed. Similarly, 440 farmers will be covered in 2018-19 through Innovative Poultry Productivity Project Low Input Technology (LIT) poultry farming in Sambalpur & Bouda District. Under the scheme each farmer will

be given assistance of Rs. 35,000/-(Shed, feed, other – Rs. 15,000, Chick Cost-20,000/-) in two years. Budgetary provision of **Rs 150.00** lakh has been proposed under NLM.

B. DAIRY DEVELOPMENT

- 1. **Establishment of 5 LLPD Dairy Plant**: This plant will be established by OMFED through operational of the plant an additional 5 lakh liters of milk will be processed daily. As a result the procurement, processing & marketing of hygienic milk will be increased in the State. An amount of Rs **5252.29** lakh has been provisioned under RIDF to facilitate the establishment of 5 lakh LLPD Dairy plant by OMFED.
- 2. Strengthening of Dairy Organisation: The scheme intends to infrastructure development at Bull Mother /LBD Farms, induction of bull mothers of different native breeds, production of semen straws etc. It is targeted to cover 30 lakh breedable bovine during 2018-19. Fund provision of **Rs. 1697.62** lakh has been made.

C. SMALL ANIMAL DEVELOPMENT:

1. Genetic Up gradation of Small Animals: Under the scheme Department has taken initiative to support farmers to establish goat units of (10+1). During 2018-19 budgetary provision of **Rs 768.50** lakh has been proposed to provide support to 4330 beneficiaries @ Rs 17,500/- (50% of Project cost Rs. 35,000/-).

D. Fodder Development Programme:

- Feed & Fodder Production in Different Agro Climatic Zone: This scheme was introduced during 2016-17. Nutritional management programme will be taken up for realizing the potential yield of dairy animals in the State. Fund amounting Rs 858.00 lakh has been proposed under the scheme during 2018-19. Under the scheme 60 fodder nurseries will be established. 65 fodder cooperative societies, 10,800 farmers will be supported for cultivation of fodder in their land coming about 1000 Ha.
- Fodder Production in Farmers land: Under National Livestock Mission it is proposed to cover perennial fodder cultivation in 334 Ha. of farmers own land in 30 districts. Assistance @ Rs. 30,000/- per Ha. of land will be transferred to the A/C of the Farmers in DBT method. An amount of Rs 100.20 lakh has been proposed during 2018-19.

E. Livestock Health Care Service

Optimum health management of the livestock resources of the State is one of the important programme being taken up by the Department. The following schemes are proposed during 2018-19.

1. Mobile Veterinary Unit: These units are operational in all 314 blocks of the State. The MVUs are operating for 20 days in a month and conduct village

level animal health camp covering at least two villages per day. Fund provision of **Rs. 1400.00** lakh has been proposed for all 314 MVUs under State Plan for 2018-19.

2. Support to Private Goshalas

There are about 11.39 lakh stray cattle in our State according to Livestock census 2012. These animals lead a miserable life due to lack of proper feeding, health care measures. Few private Gaushals provide shelter to these animals & provides feeding, health care measures etc. But these facilities are insufficient. It is needless to mention that Gohala is our cultural and religious heritage. There are 27 registered Gaushals functioning in our State. It is proposed to support the private Goushals to meet feeding cost so as to increase their activities towards rehabilitation of old, sick & abandoned animals. An amount of **Rs 200.00** lakh has been proposed during 2018-19.

- **3. GMP Compatible Vaccine Production Unit:** The HPC has approved the establishment of GMP Compatible viral vaccine production units with a cost of Rs 6760.00 lakh. As per the advice of Indian Veterinary Research Institute (IVRI) the DPR is under revision. Notional amount of **Rs 200.00** lakh has been proposed during 2018-19 for establishment of a GMP compatible viral livestock vaccine production unit. Similarly, **Rs 100.00** lakh has been kept for establishment of GMP compatible Anthrax & Entero-toxemia vaccine production unit at Berhampur.
- 4. Livestock health care Services: The aim of the scheme is to strengthen the Infrastructure of Livestock Service Institutions. Essential medicines are being provided to Veterinary Hospitals/Dispensaries for curative livestock health care. An amount of **Rs 2911.00** lakh has been provisioned for 2018-19 under "Up-gradation of Livestock Health Care service".
- 5. Strengthening of Livestock infrastructure and Modernisation of offices: The aim of the scheme is to provide referral diagnosis and treatment facilities to provide better animal health services to the livestock owners. It is proposed to develop the infrastructure of the veterinary institutions (VD/LAC) through with supply of basic equipments. Therefore it is proposed to provide advanced equipments/ instruments to dispensaries / hospitals/ livestock aid centers for provision of quality livestock health care services through supply of Modular OT., Portable Ultrasound machine, Xray Machine, Vaccination Kit, Mastitis Detector, Medicine Cabinet, Metal Detector, Surgical pack, Postmortem Kit etc. An amount of **Rs 2508.89** lakh has been proposed for 2018-19.
 - **6. FMD Control Programme** An amount of Rs 1235.00 lakh has been proposed for FMD-CP under CSS for vaccination of all eligible bovines (around 80 lakh) twice a year during 2018-19.

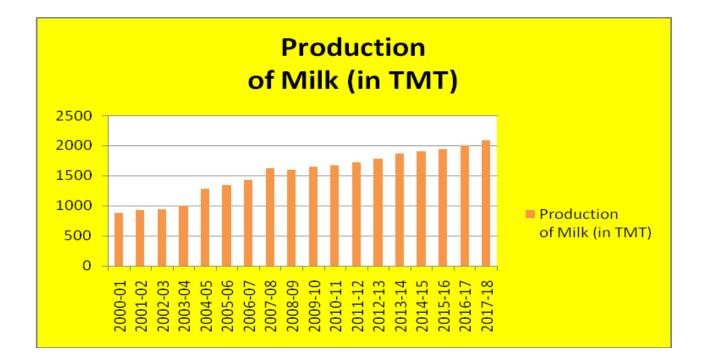
F. Human Resources Development:

- Skill Development Technology Transfer & Extension: Different training programmes (426 batches) will be organised to upgrade the skill of farmers for better production. An amount of **Rs. 109.80** lakh has been proposed under NLM during 2018-19 for this purpose.
- Up gradation of Skill of Farmers: During 2018-19, it is proposed to organize entrepreneurship development programme on dairy, small animal & Backyard poultry rearing. An amount of **Rs.103.91** lakh has been proposed.

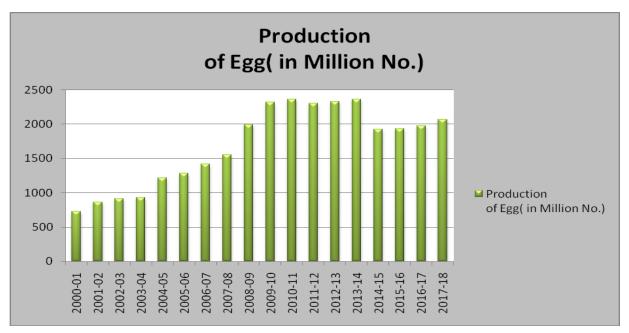
Programme Achievements

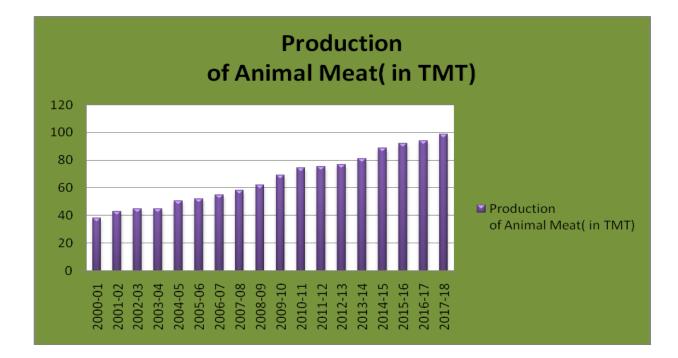
• During the year 2000-01 the milk production was 875.13 TMT (24 lakh litres/ day) which has increased to 2087.54 TMT (57 lakh litre/ day) during 2017-18.



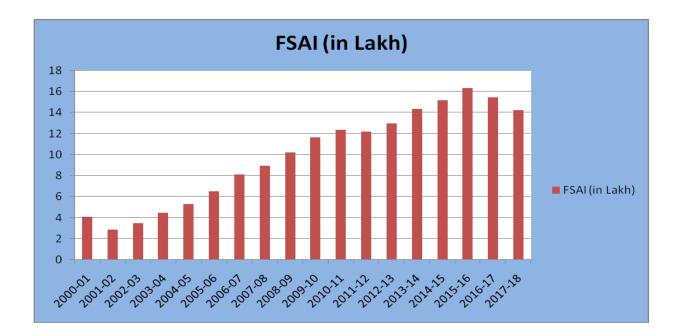
 During the year 2000-01 the egg production was 730 million nos. (20 lakh/ day) which has increased to 2062 million nos. (56 lakh) during 2017-18. Under Commercial Agri-Enterprise, 19 new layer farms have been set up in the State during last 5 years. Currently, 87 poultry layer farms with bird capacity of 62 lakh bird capacity are available in the State. The per capita availability of eggs rise from 26 (2001) to 48 (2017).



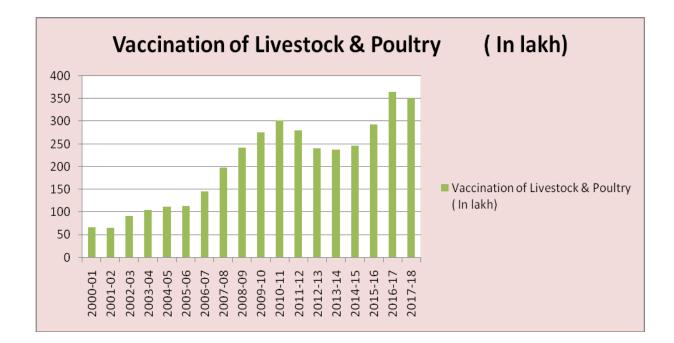
• During the year 2000-01 the animal meat production was 38.39 TMT which has increased to 98.83 TMT during 2017-18.



• The milk production in the State has increased through continuous genetic improvement of local cattle and buffaloes along with other support activities like health care, nutritional management. Last year 14.244 lakh artificial inseminations in bovines were made, which was only 4.11 lakh during the year, 2000-01.



• The vaccination coverage of animals against different contagious diseases was 352.37 lakhs during 2017-18, which was only 66.80 lakh during 2000-01.

OUTCOME BUDGET OF OM FED (2017-18)

The Odisha State Cooperative Milk Producers Federation was started during the year 1980 under Operation Flood-II programme and Registered under Society Act with Registration No- 6/BBSR Dtd. 28.01.1980.Omfed is headed by elected Board of Directors represented by Chairman and Managing Director as CEO. The functions of OMFED are carried out through the affiliated Thirteen District Milk Unions (Cuttack, Puri, Dhenkanal, Sambalpur, Keonjhar, Balasore, Mayurbhanj, KMNR, BKN, Boudh, Kandhamal, Sundergarh & Mayurbhanj). OMFED has its own Eleven Dairies (Bhubaneswar, Balasore, Sambalpur, Keonjhar, Rourkela, Jeypore, Berhampur, Bhawanipatna, Dhenkanal, Salapada and Angul) and other two Dairies i.e. at Tirtol 20,000 LPD & Tangi 10,000 LPD maintained by Cuttack & Puri Milk Union respectively. In addition to this two Cattle Feed plants one is situated at Radhadamodarpur in Cuttack district and another is at Jagannathapur in Khurda District.State Level Apex Cooperative Soceity having its brand name **OMFED**, has taken the responsibility to increase the Dairy Development activities in the State like Milk Procurement, Processing &Milk marketing.

Every financial year OMFED has prepared a budget for its turn over including all units in order to carry out its activities from Milk Procurement to Milk Marketing and developmental works. That Budget is duly approved by the Board and after completion of the financial year, the achievements made against the budgetary allocation was reviewed once again by the Board.

During the year 2017-18, OMFED has budgeted turnover of Rs. 884.45 Corer and achieved Rs. 753.09 Cores with the following outcomes in different fields such as Milk Procurement & Marketing therewith in comparison to previous year

OUTCOMES 2017-18:

1. RURAL INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT FUND (RIDF):

<u>Name of the Scheme</u>: Establishment of 5 LLPD, fully automated Dairy Plant under RIDF.

<u>Implementing Agency</u>: The Odisha State Co-operative Milk Producers Ltd.(OMFED)

In the state "Odisha State Co-Operative Milk Producers Federation Ltd" (OMFED) was established in the year 1980 and there are 13nos District Milk Unions existed now in the state . As such there are 2,70,000 nos of milk farmers and pouring around 510000 liter of milk per day to OMFED. During the year 2015-16 to 2017-18, OMFED sent around 400 lakh liter of surplus milk to Outside the state for conversion into Ghee and Skimmed Milk Powder (SMP).In this score OMFED use to incur extra expenditure to the extent of Rs13.00 Crore in a year. Hence, OMFED felt it prudent to protect the interest of milk farmers of the state. OMFED"s milk processing capacity is almost saturated. Milk procurement is increasing at a CAGR of around 7 %. Hence, the Processing Capacity enhancement is inevitable. Looking into the growth rate & milk procurement target, a new 5 lakh LPD Dairy Plant is essentially required to protect the interest of our farmers and consumers for next 5 years.

Under RIDF a project for establishment of fully automated 5lakhs liters Dairy plant at Arilo, Govindpur of Baranga Tahsil has been sanctioned in favour of OMFED. As against the estimated project cost of Rs.244.24 Crore, NABARD sanctioned Rs.244.34 Crore out of which Rs. 232.12 Crore as RIDF loan and State Govt. share of Rs.12.21 Crore.

It is pertinent to mention here that, agreement to this effect has already been materialized on 28.04.2018 with NDDB & total amount of Rs72.79 Crore has been released to NDDB for timely execution of the project work within 33 months.

2. DIFFERENT SCHEMES IMPLEMENTED BY OMFED :

OMFED has being implementing various schemes like Central Sector Plan, State Plan for dairy development in the state of Odisha. The schemes are National Project for Dairy Development (NPDD), Rashtriya Krishi Vikash Yojana (RKVY), National Dairy Plan-I by NDDB, Tribal Women Dairy Project etc.

a. National Project for Dairy Development: (NPDD)

 DAHD&F, GoI has approved four Projects under NPDD in 8 districts (Keonjhar, Puri, Khurda, Balasore, Bhadrak, Cuttack, Jajpur & Dhenkanal) in the year 2014-15. The duration of the Project is for two to three years. Out of which NPDD-Keonjhar is for three years and other three projects duration are for two years. The end of NPDD Project is up to March 17.

- Total approved Project cost is Rs.3212.92 Lakhs (GoI Share is Rs.2863.74 Lakhs).
- So far OMFED has organized 350 nos of DCS and enrolled 21171 nos of dairy cooperative farmers and procuring 61477 Ltrs per day under NPDD Project.
- There is a provision of Road Milk Tankers & Bulk Milk Coolers under NPDD projects in order to procure & Store the procured milk from DCS Level.

Assistance to Dairy Cooperative Farmers under NPDD

 SS Milk Can: During the year 2014-15 to 2017-18, OMFED has distributed 21,950 Nos of stainless steel Milk can to 21,171 Nos of framers under the proposed scheme (NPDD) in different 8 nos of District such as Keonjhar, Puri, Khurda, Balasore, Bhadrak, Cuttack, Jajpur & Dhenkanal.

b. Rashtriya Krishi Vikash Yojana (RKVY) :

The Rashtriya Krishi Vikash Yojana (RKVY) is being implemented by OMFED since the year 2007-08. Presently 13 nos of RKVY Projects are being implemented by OMFED. The projects are sanctioned under RKVY for development of dairy infrastructure like establishment of Dairy Plants, Ice Cream Plants, Modernization of old dairy plants, establishment of cooling infrastructure like Bulk Milk Coolers, for dairy development activities like Installation of Automatic Milk Collection Unit (AMCU) and for assistance to Dairy Cooperative Farmers by providing SS Milk Cans, Subsidized Cattle Feed, Concrete Flooring. Introduction of e-cart for marketing of Ice cream. Already 10 nos of e-cart are running successfully for distribution of Ice cream.

c. National Dairy Plan-I : "Ration Balancing Programme (RBP)"- 100% Assistance (NDP-1)

The Ration Balancing Programme (RBP) is being implemented in the district of Cuttack, Jagatsinghpur, Kendrapada Puri, Khurda Sambalpur, Baragarh, Jharsuguda, Balasore, Bhadrak, Koraput, Malkangiri, Nawarangpur, Rayagada & Ganjam with 100% assistance. Importance is being given for best utilization of locally available feed ingredients for milch cattle & feed them by computerized balancing on the basis of requirement & cost of ingredients for optimum production and minimization of feed cost. So far under RBP 69693 farmers covered with coverage of Animal 82285 for this purpose Local resource person Engaged is 1151.

d. TRIBAL WOMEN DAIRY PROJECT (TWDP):

The Tribal Women Diary Project has been sanctioned by the Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Govt. of India on Dt. 30.03.2015 with approved project cost of Rs.1911.83 Lakhs (Nineteen Crore Eleven Lakhs Eighty Three Thousand only). The duration of the Project is for three years i.e 2015-16 to 2018-19. The Project is being implemented in 11 Tribal districts of Odisha. So far, OMFED has organized 254 nos of Tribal Women Dairy Society and enrolled 8533 nos of farmer members and collecting 8183 Ltrs of milk daily. There is a provision to give subsidy on cattle feed, mineral mixture, SS Milk Can, De-worming medicines and different kinds of training programme to tribal women farmer members.

Realizing the ensuing growing trend of milk procurement in the State, OMFED felt it necessary to enhance the budget during the financial year 2018-19 & accordingly has made the budget estimate with a target turnover of Rs 913.32 Crore ,with an approximate procurement of 21,44,45,655 liter of milk and marketing of 19,85,11,455 liter of milk.

Budgetary Provision & Outcomes of OMFED during 2018-19:

<u>"INCENTIVE TO THE DAIRY FARMERS" UNDER STATE PLAN</u> NUTRITIONAL SUPPORT TO DAIRY FARMERS

Keeping in view the price hike in raw materials & agricultural byproducts which are in habitably used for feeding cattle has resulted in increase of the cost of balanced cattle feed available in market. As such, the escalation has adversely affected the profit margin in dairying. Underfeeding ultimately results in low milk production. Incentive to farmers will encourage them to feed their milch cattle for optimum milk production and productivity matching to genetic potentials. The dairy farmers covered under the project are mostly small & marginal farmer category. Increase in milk production will contribute to strengthen the rural economy. Milk production need to be enhanced to ensure food security for ever growing population of the state. The cost of production has increased due to cattle feed price escalation, hence direct support is required on cattle feed to support the farmers to continue with dairy activity. During the flush season green fodder is available abundantly for which concentrated cattle feed requirement reduces. The farmer faces the difficulty in lean season to maintain the milk procurement and largely depends on cattle feed and it becomes costlier. Under such situation increase in cost of production considerably reduces the profit margin of the milk producer. Considering the above, to partially support the farmers Rs.1.00/- Liter of milk has been proposed towards cattle feed expenditure incurred during the lean period. A project has been approved for a period of two years i.e. for 2018-19 & 2019-20 with approved project cost of Rs.2482.12 Lakhs.

The main objective of this project is to derive optimum milk production as per the genetic potentially of the Cross Bred Cow through feeding balanced ration, to enhance the margin of profit from Dairy farming by giving incentive or feed ration, to reduce inter-calving period through better care and management, to reduce reproductive disorders, to encourage the dairy farmers to continue in the enterprise, to attract new pouring members to the society fold and to increase milk procurement through OMFED from present level of average 5.15 Lakh Liters per day by the end of the project period.

The Project is being operated directly by OMFED from 2018-19 and has to release the incentive Support amount to Bank Account of Dairy farmers of DCS. The Incentive support is given for lean season from August to March only. Only register pouring members are eligible that to who have entered into agreement with DCS. The farmers who are supplying milk having quality norm of OMFED are a only be considered for incentive. And the members supplying adulterated / substandard milk are not eligible for incentive. The month wise projected Milk Procurement in Itrs and requirement of milch ration and incentive to be released are given in a table which indicates that during the year 2018-19 Rs.1208.29 Lakhs will be released and Rs.1273.80 Lakhs will be released during the year

2019-20. In the current year i.e. up to September 2018 an amount of Rs1.04 Crs to 75,000 Nos of milk pouring farmers have been paid through on-line(DBT) to their respective bank accounts.

Purchase of Maize from Nawarangpur Farmers :

In order to maintain the production consistency both the cattle feed plants at Radhadamodarpur Khuntuni & Jagannathapur at OMTDC, OMFED has purchased Maize from 3 nos of Farmers Producers Company i.e. Umerkote Kissan Udyog Producers Company Ltd, M/s Anchaklika Mahila Vikash Cooperative Society Ltd. & M/s Danteswari Women Producers Company Ltd. @ Rs.15979/-. Till date 5060 MT Maize has been supplied by these farmers producers companies and OMFED has released RS.80,86,8041.00 to maize cultivators of Nawarangpur District through above farmers producers companies.

There is additional requirement of 1800 MT Maize in the month of Nov"18 & December 2018 for CFP Radhadamodarpur & CFP Jagannathapur respectively.

- OMFED is releasing Rs. 528.143 Crore daily towards payment to dairy farmers.

- Supply of OMFED Ghee to Lord Jaganath Temple and Lingaraj Temple has commenced from Sept. & Dec."2017 respectively.
- Launching of Protein rich Gold Premium Milk & new Milk Products such as Sugar Free Ice-Cream/Sweet Curd, Sugar Free Vanilla Ice-Cream & Probiotic curd on 25th Sepetmber"2017.
- No Restriction in Milk Procurement from dairy farmers of the societies even during flush season (2017-18 & 2018-19).
- For the first time, Bulk Sale of Milk 1,14,22,292 Kg of Milk was done by OMFED during the flush season(2017-18) to Jharkhand, Bihar & Chhattisgarh.
- OMFED goes online marketing through M/S Grozip.com on 30.10.2017.
- Milk Procurement has made @ 4.6% growth compared to last year.
- Agreement between DCS and Society Members has been executed in all the Societies.
- Premium Cattle Feed (New) is made available to the farmers @Rs.19/Kg. being produced at CFP, Radhadamodarpur.
- Lot of steps have been taken by OMFED to expand its marketing horizon to the remote and untapped areas to create a sustainable consumer base.
- To provide employment to unemployed persons, soft loans through Banks under NABARD"s subsidized financial outlay has been introduced in OMFED. A convergence Meeting between Directorate of AH and VS, Cuttack and OMFED was organized for successful implementation of Dairy Entrepreneurship Development Scheme (DEDS) in the state.

- The scheme aims to provide financial assistance up to Rs.3.00 lakhs for setting up Milk Booths in Block Headquarters, Sadar HQs, rural as well as in urban areas for self-employment of 500 no. Unemployed youths. The General category people shall be eligible for 25% & the SC/ST category of people shall get 33% subsidy on the loan for setting of OMFED parlor.
- OMFED has setup exclusive milk parlors and Ice-Cream parlors in various places of Odisha for easy availability of milk and milk products to the customers.
- OMFED has tied up its business, opening sales stall in special Jail, Jharpada, Bhubaneswar, Circle Jail, Choudwar & Berhampur.
- Other initiative includes Branding of Bread in the name of OMFED with Urban Micro Business Centre of M/S Centurion University, Bhubaneswar for business on PPP mode. Now OMFED supplies 3 varieties of Breads i.e. Brown, Milky and White to the consumers of Bhubaneswar, Cuttack and Jatni.
- Milk Powder Plant is made operational for conversion of 25000-30000 ltrs of milk to Milk Powder at Bhubaneswar Dairy daily at present.
- For benefit of consumers OMFED has introduced fortified milk with vitamin "A" &"D".

As a whole, the advent of OMFED has registered a tangible growth in case of numbers of milk farmers and the quantity of milk production in the state. Above all, it is pertinent to say that OMFED has emphasized the growth in production of Milk & has registered a stable & healthy economic growth of farmers of the State by launching different popular schemes as enumerated above.

REFORM MEASURES & POLICY INITIATIVES

- A State level consultation workshop was organized on 30.04.2014 for implementation of Odisha Fishery Policy for development and smooth management of fishery activities in Odisha State. The draft Memorandum on Odisha Fishery Policy was submitted to Govt. in Fisheries & ARD Department by the Director of Fisheries, Odisha, vide Letter No.11252 Dt.25.07.2014. After proper scrutiny and rectification of the Draft Policy, it was placed before Government in Finance Department and has been concurred on 09.06.2015. Subsequently the Final Policy was placed before the Chief Secretary, Odisha and Hon'ble Minister, Fisheries & ARD, Odisha and was approved on 19.06.2015. The Odisha Fishery Policy, 2015 has been approved and published in Odisha Gazette No-1282 dt.31.08.2015.
- Increasing Freshwater area of 2,000 ha.per year under different Pond development Programmes.
- > Promotion of white shrimp culture L.vannamei.
- Excavation of multi-purpose fish farm ponds in all blocks of the State initiating integrated farming so as to provide livelihood and nutritional security to small, marginal, SC & ST farmers.
- Special package subsidy assistance @ Rs.15000/- towards input costs to the farmers for development of multipurpose ponds under MGNREGS through RKVY scheme (Matsya Credit Card).
- Promotion of Pisciculture in GP tanks through Women SHGs with input subsidy assistance @60% under RKVY Programmes.
- Reservoir Fisheries development and promotion of cage culture through RKVY assistance.
- Establishment of GIFT tilapia multiplication center of Government fish farm at Kausalyagang.
- > Modernisation of Chandrabhaga Prawn Hatchery as a multipurpose hatchery unit for production of L.vannamei shrimp through PPP mode.
- Creation of self employed opportunities for 5000 unemployed youth in different activities.

ARD SECTOR

REFORM MEASURES & POLICY INITIATIVES

INITIATIVES:

Livestock sector plays an important role in rural economy of the State. This is the sector where the poor get benefits directly. The ownership of the livestock in the State is more evenly distributed with landless labourers and marginal farmers owning majority of livestock. This is one of the sector in which the rural women play a significant role and are directly involved in most of the operations relating to feeding, breeding, management and health-care of the livestock.

Change in design & delivery Mechanism of existing Schemes:

Keeping in view the objective of the Department & commitment towards livestock development in the State, the Annual Plan 2018-19 has been emphasized on providing support to livestock farmers to enhance livestock production & productivity in the State. It is planned to bridge the critical gaps in service delivery system and to adopt improvements for revitalizing the present status of the Livestock service delivery institutions. The main purpose of this plan is to critically analyze the present status of input provision to farmers, service delivery mechanism, infrastructural availability, contribution of livestock and accordingly suggest measures for improvement of the Animal Resources Development Sector so as to increase the production and productivity in a phased manner. The department has taken steps for service delivery at the door steps of the farmers. The following measures have been taken.

- i. Mobile Veterinary units have been made operational in each Block of the State under State plan funding. Govt. has created 314 permanent Veterinary Assistant Surgeon posts for effective implementation of MVU programme.
- ii. Veterinary Ambulances have been introduced in Bhubaneswar. Initiative has been taken to introduce similar facilities in Cuttack, Sambalpur, Puri and Berhampur on pilot basis to attend the livestock/pets in distress.
- iii. Direct fund transfer to the accounts of the beneficiaries being made in the subsidy linked schemes like perennial fodder production in farmers field etc.

Change in Internal Process of the Department in Relation to administration of the Schemes:

No change in internal process of the department in relation to administration of the schemes has been made. However, the schemes are being monitored by the Director, A.H & V.S in the Directorate level. The Directorate of Animal Husbandry & Veterinary Services is functioning as the Heads of the Department at Cuttack. There are 30 Chief District Veterinary Officers in each Revenue Districts and 58 Sub-Divisional Veterinary Officers (SDVO) are functioning in 58 revenue Sub-Divisions. The Chief District Veterinary Officer is the Controlling Authority for all the Departmental activities/ schemes implemented in the respective district. At block level the Block Veterinary officers monitor the schemes.

Policy Reforms for Development of Livestock Sector:

During 2017-18 the policies formulated earlier were implemented. But, the year 2015-16 witnessed milestone achievement with regard to enactment of different policies, as outlined below, for growth and development in Livestock Sector of the State.

1. Odisha Bovine Breeding Policy, 2015:

The Odisha Bovine Breeding Policy, 2015 has been formulated for genetic up-gradation of cattle and buffaloes found in Odisha. The said Policy was approved by Odisha Cabinet and notified in the Extraordinary issue of Odisha Gazette vide No. 12097–3V(B)-40/2015/FARD Dated 3rd October, 2015. The Policy aims at achieving socio-economic up-liftment of a large number of farmers of our State who have been adopting dairying as a dependable source of their livelihood. The performance potentialities of cattle and buffaloes of Odisha will be improved through intervention of several scientific breeding techniques, like, Participatory Field Research activities on cattle and buffalo breeding which includes Field Performance Recording Scheme [FPRS], Field Progeny Testing Program [FPTP] and also through application of Information and Technology in the field of livestock breeding and reproduction, like, Information Network on Animal Production & Health (INAPH).

2. Odisha Poultry Policy, 2015:

The Odisha Poultry Policy, 2015 was notified in extraordinary issue of Odisha Gazette vide No. 12095–10V (A)-63/2015/FARD dated 3rd October, 2015. The Poultry Policy aims to address various interlinked concerns through a simultaneous and multi-pronged action with an emphasis on improvement in production technology and infrastructure, pushing up capital formation, re-structuring the incentives and streamlining the institutions. The main objectives of the policy are to enable a conducive environment for commercial poultry farming in the State, to promote backyard poultry farming for livelihood & to produce 100 lakh egg per day and 100 TMT broiler meat per annum.

3. Odisha Small Animal Policy:

The Department has drafted a Small Animal Policy for the State by organizing a Seminar involving different Stake holders. The same is under active consideration of Government awaiting approval and notification. This policy will boost the development in Small Animal Sector of the State.

4. Odisha Pig Breeding Policy 2018:

The Department has drafted a Pig Breeding Policy, 2018 for the State by organizing a Seminar involving different Stake holders. The same is under active consideration of Government awaiting approval and notification. This policy will boost the development in Pig Sector of the State.

Change in the composition of Beneficiaries

No change in the composition of beneficiaries has been adopted during 2018-19. However, priority has been given to include weaker section, marginal farmers for inclusion in the scheme as beneficiary. Initiative has been taken to organize skill up gradation training programme exclusively for women farmers on backyard poultry rearing. It is also proposed to ear mark at least 30% of total beneficiaries for women farmers under goat rearing scheme.

PAST PERFORMANCE OF PROGRAMMES & SCHEMES IMPLEMENTED DURING THE YEAR 2016–17 & 2017–18

During 2016-17 focussed attention was given for policy reforms. Two new policies namely Odisha Bovine Breeding Policy, 2015 & Odisha Poultry Policy, 2015 have been notified by Govt. & the Draft Odisha Small ruminant policy is under active consideration of Govt. for notification.

During the Year, 2017-18, all time record production of 197.10 lakh doses of Haemorrhagic Septicemia, Black Quarter, Anthrax, Enterotoxaemia vaccine and Ranikhet Disease vaccine has been achieved. There is appreciable increase in animal meat production which has reached 98 TMT. The Draft Pig Breeding Policy has been formulated & under examination of Govt. The scheme wise performances are mentioned in the following tables.

ARD SECTOR

GENDER & SC/ST BUDGETING

GENDER BUDGETING:

Majority of the animal husbandry activities like the care and management of milch animals, milking of dairy animal, grazing of small ruminants are dealt by women and most of the labour engaged in rural livestock production is women. Live stock sector is thus extremely livelihood intensive, closely interwoven into the socio economic fabric of the rural society. Women are mainly involved in back yard poultry & small animal rearing. In previous years plan budgets the gender component is not captured separately. But during 2016-17 the Department has taken attempt to address the need of women livestock farmers. It is proposed to continue activities during 2018-19 as well specifically for women.

UP-GRADATION OF SKILL IN SELF-EMPLOYMENT UNDER ARD SECTOR

The scheme has the objective of updating the skill of the livestock owners and the educated unemployed youth for taking up the animal husbandry activity as means of self employment & enriching the knowledge of existing livestock farmers. Each training batch includes 20 farmers having interest for adopting Animal Husbandry as the occupation for self-employment. Animal Husbandry based enterprise has been considered as viable way of economic development in rural area. It is well recognized now that the farmers can be nurtured better through appropriate interventions. It is proposed to cover at least 30 % women beneficiaries under the programme of skill up gradation training programme.

SUPPORT FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF GOAT UNITS

(Under the Scheme-Genetic Up-Gradation of Small Animals)

The small animal breeding stocks produced at Govt. small animal farms are not sufficient to meet the breeding stock demand of small ruminant farmers of our State. In addition to the interventions in Government farms it is proposed to encourage entrepreneurs to take up small scale goat/ sheep farms through back ended assistance of Rs. 12,500/- for establishment of goat /sheep units of (10 female+1 male) capacity. Those entrepreneurs will be provided with technical support by field level functionaries for production of superior off springs at their farm which can be utilized for further breeding. It is proposed to select at least 30% women beneficiary out of the total targeted beneficiaries (4161 beneficiaries).

SC / ST BUDGETING:

Tribal Sub-Plan:

As per 2011 Census, the tribal population constitute 22.85% of the total population of the State. About 95% reside in rural areas and majority of workers are agricultural labourers. The objective of TSP is to uplift the socioeconomic status of the tribal community. The Plan Budget Flow under TSP & SCSP during 2017–18 under different schemes implemented through Directorate of Animal Husbandry & Veterinary Services is given in the table below.
